WHO WE ARE



The **Future Generations Foundation** (FG Foundation) is Canada's largest First Nations-led non-governmental funder, supporting the prosperity and well-being of First Nations through connection to way of life, language, and culture — now and for future generations. We provide flexible grant funding that strengthens education, cultural revitalization, healing, and community development from coast to coast to coast.

Our approach is relationship-centred and grounded in First Nations governance, cultural understanding, and lived experience. We honour community autonomy, uphold cultural protocols, and work to ensure resources reach the people and places driving long-term, self-determined change. Our support reaches remote and urban Nations alike, enabling language programs, healing initiatives, land-based education, post-secondary learning, and community-led development. Each year, thousands of individuals and organizations turn to the FG Foundation to advance their own paths to well-being and cultural strength.

As stewards of the remaining Indian Residential School Settlement Agreement (IRSSA) funds, we carry a profound responsibility to Survivors of Residential Schools. Since our inception, we have redistributed over **\$130 million** to **910 organizations** and **10,600+ individuals**, reaching more than **150,000 Residential School Survivors** and their descendants.

A former Indigenous Student Trustee for the Limestone District School Board, she has long advocated for inclusive education and Indigenous youth leadership. At Trent, Emily focuses on issues like drinking water safety and food security, working to advance environmental solutions grounded in Indigenous knowledge and community needs.

ORGANIZATIONS

We fund community-driven projects that strengthen **language and culture, promote healing and reconciliation, enhance education and employment, and nurture youth and family connections.**

Aunties on the Road *Ontario*

Aunties on the Road provides culturally grounded, no-cost doula care to Indigenous families in Ottawa-Gatineau.

Youth-led and supported by Minwaashin Lodge, the Collective offers trauma-informed support rooted in traditional Auntie teachings.

With support from the FG Foundation, the Collective has expanded its ability to offer culturally safe guidance through major life transitions, revitalizing traditional birth and reproductive care knowledge and strengthening resilience for urban Indigenous families.

CLOSING THE GAP, STRENGTHENING THE FUTURE

Across Canada, First Nations communities are carrying forward powerful work to revitalize languages, strengthen cultural knowledge, and support healing. In many places, Elders are teaching the next generation the words and stories that have sustained their Nations since time immemorial. Families and communities are rebuilding relationships disrupted by generations of systemic harm. Youth are returning to the land to reconnect with cultural identity and increasingly, they are seeking higher education opportunities to shape strong futures for themselves, their families, and their Nations.

These efforts are vibrant, community-led, and full of promise, but they continue to face systemic barrier and significant gaps in access to the resources needed to sustain them. **Indigenous peoples represent 4.9% of the population, but receive less than 1% of all philanthropic support.** This inequity limits opportunities for communities to advance the cultural, educational, and healing initiatives they are leading with courage and determination. Community leaders know what their people need, yet available funding rarely matches the scale of their vision. Each year, more requests come forward than can be supported, leaving critical initiatives underfunded or delayed.

This is where you can make a profound difference.

By joining the movement to uplift community-driven work, you can help close the gap between vision and resources — ensuring more language speakers are supported, more cultural knowledge is passed on, and more young people can thrive in strong, healthy communities.

Together, we can help ensure that the resurgence underway today continues to grow — for the next generation, and the ones yet to come.



THE RESOURCE GAP

Under the restrictions of the court settlement, only 50% of the IRSSA funds can be allocated to current granting streams, with the remaining 50% held in investment and inaccessible until 2035, leaving many needs unmet year after year.

Further constraints include:

- The maximum benefit for a regional organization or institution is **\$200,000**
- Organizations are only eligible for **two funding agreements within a ten-year period**, limiting their ability to drive sustained impact and progress on critical programs.

Despite these challenges, the FG Foundation has directly impacted over 315,000 First Nations peoples from coast to coast to coast in just ten years. However, **the demand for support far exceeds the resources available.**


Historically, 53% of individual applicants and 61% of organization applicants are denied funding due to limited resources.

Those who do receive funding are often supported at amounts far below what they request, limiting the full potential of their projects.


Donor contributions strengthened our ability to meet community demand in 2024-2025:

- We funded **77% of individual applicants**, a **24% increase** because of **additional funding partnerships**, while meeting **41% of the total funding requested**.
- We supported **58% of organizational applicants**, a **19% increase** because of **additional funding partnerships**, while covering **32% of the requested funding**.

GROWING OUR INTERNAL CAPACITY



To fully realize our mission, the Future Generations Foundation must have the internal capacity to support the scale of work First Nations communities are leading. Under the IRSSA, our administrative spending is restricted, which limits our ability to expand our team and strengthen the systems needed to serve a growing national network. While these restrictions ensure responsible stewardship of Survivor-directed funds, they also constrain our ability to evolve as a modern, strategic, culturally grounded funder.

Demand for our support continues to grow each year. To meet this demand — and ensure our grantmaking remains aligned with our strategic vision — we must strengthen the foundation that enables effective, responsive service to communities.

Philanthropic investment in our capacity will allow us to:

Expand Our Team

We need additional staff in grants administration, community engagement, finance, data, and communications to ensure timely processing, stronger support for applicants, and deeper relationships with communities.

Advance Impact Measurement

We are developing a comprehensive impact study — including a Theory of Change, Key Performance Indicators, and a Monitoring, Evaluation, and Learning framework. This work is essential for understanding long-term outcomes and strengthening accountability to Residential School Survivors, First Nations communities, partners and donors.

Elevate Storytelling and Shared Learning

With thousands of funded initiatives, there is tremendous knowledge to share. Building our capacity in communications will help us honour Survivors, highlight community leadership, and amplify the impact of this work.

WHY PARTNER WITH US?

1. We Support First Nations Non-Qualified Donees

We are one of the few national funders able to provide grants to First Nations as non-qualified donees. This ensures resources reach communities without unnecessary barriers and supports the autonomy and self-determination of Nations leading their own healing, cultural, and educational work.

2. Sound Management & Consistent Growth

We have a proven track record of stable growth, responsible stewardship, and strategic investment. Our governance model, oversight, and internal systems ensure funds are managed with integrity and aligned with community priorities.

3. Supporting Self-Determination

Our programs enable individuals and organizations to make decisions rooted in their own priorities — whether education, cultural learning, or healing. Support is flexible and responsive, ensuring people can pursue what is most meaningful to them.

4. Diverse and Culturally Grounded Education Funding

We fund a wide range of learning pathways, from post-secondary degrees to land-based teachings, language instruction, cultural mentorship, and traditional knowledge passed down by Elders. Education is defined by the individual themselves.

5. Unique Focus on Healing

We are the only national funder dedicated to addressing the harms of Residential Schools by supporting cultural activities, language revitalization, healing journeys, and education.

7. National, First Nations-Led Governance

Our eleven-member Board of Trustees represents every region of the country, ensuring strategies and investments reflect the diversity of Nations across Turtle Island and remain grounded in lived experience.
